Heritage Foundation Celebrates 40th Anniversary Charter Day Dinner Features Special Video and VIP Guests

The Heritage Foundation capped its 40th anniversary year celebration with its Charter Day Banquet at Seven Oaks Country Club on Oct. 19, 2007. VIP guests included Nymphe Phillips Kefal and Dr. Phil Phillips, children of Heritage Foundation founder Harry Phillips; as well as Beaver Mayor Tom Hamilton and several Beaver Borough Council members.

President Art Cornell provided a cheery welcome, and gave a state of the union address spelling out significant strides the Heritage Foundation and Historical Museum have made in 2007.

Art unveiled a letter written by General Lachlan McIntosh, builder of the Revolutionary War era fort located in Beaver, and recently acquired by the museum. (See more on page 3.)

Art also announced that the museum had obtained the extraordinary "Scott Collection" of documents and artifacts, spanning more that 150 years of Brighton Township history, and providing insights into the lives of 18th century Western Pennsylvanians. (See page 2 for more.)

The hands were gentle but firm as they grasped my lapel. It was 1967 and the voice was strong and insistent: "You people don't realize what you have here. I studied hard to earn my U.S. Citizenship, and what I learned about this land and this town was absolutely amazing to me," he said, "and yet nobody seems to give it any thought. You people must find some way to tell this story."

When no one else seemed ready to "do something" about it, Harry Phillips, a Greek immigrant and local restaurant owner, took the bull by the horns himself and formed a historical society. This was how the Beaver Area Heritage Foundation came into being. From this humble beginning has grown a community organization of some 450 members that has had an enormous impact on the image of Beaver."

Display to Highlight Nov. 15 Membership Meeting

The museum has received a remarkable donation by Leila (Lee) McDonald Fouts known as the Scott Collection. Items will be displayed at the general membership meeting on Thurs., Nov. 15, 2007 at 7:30 p.m. in the Trinity Episcopal Church.

The collection is the sprawling history and story of the Scott and McKee families – specifically, William Scott who married Nancy McKee and owned a farm in Brighton Township. Some of the items include:

- approximately 1,000 letters from 1786 to 1953
- 18th century letter addressed to "James Scott at Fort Pitt"
- hundreds of Civil War-era letters
- hand written receipts from 1822
- ledger started in 1709
- Brighton Township tax records
- 1850 list of families living in Brighton Township
- teaching contracts and certificates
- poems, photographs, calling cards, invitations, wills, death notices and much more.

William and Nancy's eldest son David served in the 140th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry during the Civil War. He was wounded in the jaw at the Battle of Gettysburg. Artifacts from his military service and injury are a fascinating part of the collection.

Donor Lee Fouts grew up in Beaver and was a 1955 graduate of Beaver High School. In 1954, her mother, antique dealer Mary McDonald Robbins, acquired the collection after seeing it at the home of Scott family descendant Jane Scott. In 2005, while on a tour of our museum as part of her 50th class reunion, Lee told classmate Art Cornell about the items, and remarked that these articles belong at the museum.

The Heritage Foundation and museum expresses its deep gratitude to Lee for this generous donation.

The celebration concluded with a multi-media DVD presentation directed by David O'Leary and produced by Tom Dowlin. The DVD featured Nymphe Kefal sharing warm memories of her father, and of growing up in Beaver. The DVD also highlighted interviews with key officers, volunteers and long time members.

Everyone attending received a copy of a proclamation from Mayor Hamilton congratulating the Heritage Foundation on its 40 years of "promoting awareness and appreciation of the rich history of the Beaver Area." A miniature of the proclamation is seen at right.

John McLaughlin, Chair of the Nominating Committee, announced that the slate of officers and board members for 2008 was full and would be voted upon at the general membership meeting on Nov. 15, 2007. Museum Obtains Rare Letter By Fort Builder Lachlan McIntosh

Group of Private Investors Secure Item At Auction for Donation to Museum Collection



The museum recently obtained an original letter, dated 1780, penned by Gen. Lachlan McIntosh, builder of the Beaver fort that bore his name. It was written while he was a POW of the British Army during the Revolutionary War. It may be the only letter of his that still exists. Thanks to Adam Fitz, the letter was won at auction at a price of

\$2,750, and donated to the museum. Adam recruited a group of private investors who to date have contributed \$2,000. The Heritage Foundation is seeking additional donors who will cover the \$750 balance.


